ACTIVITIES

- What type of activity is the person after? How old is the child(ren)? Does it need to be in an certain area of town?
- Key messages:
 - o For under fives there are lots of different activities and groups. These are mainly toddler groups, children's centre groups, activity groups and private activities.
 - o For 5 to 18 year olds a key source of activities is the Shine programme. This is produced every school holiday time. It is available in the form of a newspaper but also online at www.yor-ok.org.uk/shine.
 - o If it is activities for adults or adult education direct people towards the Yortime website. www.yortime.org.uk

CARERS

Carers provide regular help to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour due to frailty, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability. A key channel of support is via York Carers Centre on www.yorkcarerscentre.co.uk or 01904 715490.

CHILDCARE COSTS

- Childcare Element of Working Tax credit can pay up to 70% of childcare costs but it depends on how much you earn. All parents /carers in the house must be working for 16 or more hours a week. You can get an estimate of how much you could get by calling 0345 300 3900.
- Childcare Vouchers are through people's employer. People can choose to take some of their salary in the form of voucher (paper or electronic) that they can spend on registered childcare. Where people make their money is they do not pay tax or national insurance no this part of their salary. To arrange a childcare voucher people need to talk to their employer.
- Free early years entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds starts the **term after** a child's third birthday. They can claim 15 hours of free childcare during school term time (38 weeks of the year). For info contact FIS or visit www.yor-ok.org.uk/fis.
 - Any hours or weeks over this need to be paid for by the parent. They should check with their childcare provider how this will work for them so they know what to expect to get for a bill.
 - To claim the money parents fill in a claim form with a childcare provider at the beginning of each term. The council pay the childcare providers for the hours they are using. The parents should then just pay for any extra hours or weeks.
 - If parents choose to start part time at school this will count as them using their free hours.
- Some families may be entitled to free early years entitlement for 2 year olds which would start the **term after** a child's second birthday. They can claim 15 hours of free childcare a week during school term time or stretch the hours across the year. Please check www.yor-ok.org.uk/childcare to see if the family are eligible.

DISABILITY ADDITIONAL NEEDS

Families also then receive a MAX card which entitles the family to discounted entry to participating museums, galleries and activities.
