## Overall grade and comment

Quality of early education provision is an issue in this local authority, with 29 per cent of three and four year olds receiving their free early education in settings judged by Ofsted to be inadequate or in need of improvement, compared with 15 per cent nationally. This local authority needs to work hard to ensure that all children benefit from high quality free early education.
