




Average PVI nursery and pre-school occupancy levels: all ages








Childminder occupancy levels: all ages





Ofsted's second report into the impact of the pandemic



- Being out of the setting had "significantly impacted the learning and development" of those who left and returned.
- Interviewees reported lower confidence and more anxiety in children.
- 53% reported a decline in children's personal, social and emotional development.

In response to changes in children's needs providers made various adjustments:



- Increased focus on key areas of learning, especially on social and emotional development, and personal hygiene.
- Increased outdoor playtime and focus on motor skills since many children had spent more time indoors and become more sedentary.
- Focussed on kindness, listening and taking turns to help children settle in again.
